In the lead-up to the 2024 election, some state lawmakers have ramped up efforts to protect GOP gerrymanders and curtail the power of both voters and election officials.

- In Wisconsin, Republican lawmakers are threatening to impeach both the state's election administrator and a state Supreme Court justice despite a ruling finding no wrongdoing by the state's judicial commission — effectively nullifying a recent statewide election she won, Democrats say.
- In North Carolina, a bill that would give the legislature control of state and local election boards — potentially allowing lawmakers to overturn results — could soon become law.
- And Alabama continues to defy the U.S. Supreme Court by refusing to draw a new congressional district with a Black majority.

Young voters in U.S. and Oklahoma less likely to vote in 2024 or pick a political side

Young voters are more politically disengaged than older generations but also might be less polarized, national polling indicates.

About a third of young adults don't intend to vote or participate civically in the 2024 elections, and 61% said they don't align with either major political party, national polling of Americans age 18-24 by the civic-focused Institute for Citizens & Scholars found. Results showed young adults are more willing to have conversations with people of different views and identified themselves at or near the ideological center, creating optimism that Generation Z could help tackle polarization, the institute reported. | Oklahoma Voice

<u>Absentee ballot application outage frustrates some election officials, leaves others unaffected</u>

For more than two months, Indiana voters attempting to apply for an absentee ballot online were met with a block of bright red text informing them that the function was down while the state complied with new — and controversial — voter identification requirements.

The service went back online Friday, with just a month and a half before the ballots themselves are due for the November 7 municipal elections. Although voters could apply by other means, some county election officials — of both major parties — called the outage "concerning" and "inexcusable" for voters. 
