This year, the Republican National Committee has hosted three GOP presidential debates — and frontrunner former President Donald Trump has skipped all three. Before the 2024 presidential nominating cycle begins, there are still a few debates left on the docket:

- The RNC will hold its fourth <u>Republican Presidential Debate</u> in Tuscaloosa, Alabama on Dec. 6.
- Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis, a Republican presidential candidate, and California Gov.
 Gavin Newsom rising political stars who lead two of the nation's most populous and
 diverse states will debate Nov. 30 in Georgia.
- Presidential debates for the Republican and Democratic nominees ahead of the 2024 general election are also in the works, with the nonpartisan Commission on Presidential Debates <u>scheduling its first debate</u> for Sept. 16, 2024 in San Marcos, Texas.

Voting rights advocates decry 'calamitous ruling' on Voting Rights Act

Following a federal court ruling limiting the scope of the Voting Rights Act, Michigan officials say the urgency has only increased to pass state-level legislation to protect minority voters.

A three-judge panel of the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that only the United States attorney general can enforce the Voting Rights Act of 1965 (VRA), and thus private individuals can't sue under Section 2 of the VRA, which prohibits abridging the right to vote on the basis of race. While GOP Arkansas Attorney General Tim Griffin — a member of the redistricting board — praised the decision in a statement as "a victory for our citizens and for the rule of law," voting rights advocates argue it is the opposite of that. | Michigan Advance
