Welcome to the official start of the 2024 Republican presidential nominating contest!

It's the day of the Iowa GOP caucuses, where participants will weigh in as first-in-the-nation for who will become the party's nominee to take on President Joe Biden in the November election.

- Are you an Iowan wanting to caucus? The Iowa Republican caucuses will kick off at 7 p.m. at precinct locations throughout the state: <u>Here's what you need to know</u>.
- A new <u>Des Moines Register/NBC News/Mediacom Iowa Poll</u> dropped Saturday showing that former President Donald Trump continues to hold his lead in Iowa by a wide margin, with 48% of likely Republican caucusgoers naming him as their first choice.
- The poll also found former U.N. Ambassador Nikki Haley overtook Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis for the first time in Iowa with 20% and 16% respectively.
- While enthusiasm is high heading into the nominating cycle, <u>Iowa GOP officials say</u> wind chill and the recent blizzard could impact turnout at tonight's events. Temperatures are expected to stay below zero degrees Fahrenheit throughout the state Monday.


